CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT OF ALBANY

District Improvement Director (Elementary Division)

- Provide ongoing support to elementary schools within the district that have been identified as low performing by the NY State Education department
- Collaborates with the State Education's Office technical assistance teams to provide technical assistance for school improvement
- Analyzes data related to student achievement, attendance, and behavior to inform decision-making and measure progress toward improvement goals.
- Oversees the implementation of the community school strategy for 8 schools (5 elementary, 2 middle and 1 alternative program)
- Provides supervision, professional development, and support to staff members responsible for leading the community school strategy

 - Unemployment rate: 18%

 - Approx. 25% of the student
 population living in temporary
 housing, doubled up, or foster
 care



PS48 JOSEPH R. DRAKE Lead Community Based Organization: United Community Schools

- ★ Statistics + Partners:
 - Hunts Point Alliance for Children (HPAC)
 conducts a mood meter 3x per week with 4th
 and 5th grade, 117 students in total
 - Brighter Bites provides SNAP education to all grades, 480 students in total
 - SY2023-2024
 - Held 2 pantries through NYCP serving 99
 families and 21 community members
 - SY2022-2023
 - Held 4 pantries through NKH funding
 - Held 7 through New York Common
 Pantry(NYCP) serving 195 families and 126
 community members
