



# What Are Special Provisions for School Meals?

## What Are Special Provisions?

**Special provisions** in the School Breakfast Program (SBP) and National School Lunch Program (NSLP) <u>reduce the paperwork burden</u> required for students and their households, schools, and districts to participate in school meal programs.






Students/households submit free and reduced-price (FRP) meal applications less often (or not at all)

## The Four Special Provisions

How do meal reimbursements work? #### The Four Special Provisions

#### **Use of Special Provisions in NSLP Schools, SY 22-23 (NCES)**



The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) streamlines school meal operations by allowing schools/districts with a minimum percentage of **identified students** to provide **no-cost meals to all students** 

as well as forgo the collection of free and reduced-price applications.

The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)

streamlines school meal operations by allowing schools/districts with

a minimum percentage of identified students

to provide **no-cost meals to all students** 

as well as forgo the collection of free and reduced-price applications.

direct certification (SNAP, TANF, FDPIR, Medicaid)

categorical eligibility (homeless, runaway, migrant, foster, Head Start)

cannot collect paid and reduced-price meal co-pays

cannot collect free/reduced-price school meal applications

- A school/group of schools/district must have an identified student percentage (ISP) of <u>at least 25%</u> to adopt CEP
- Meal counting and claiming is streamlined
  - No co-pays  $\rightarrow$  no tracking meals by category; only counts

no co-pay collection = <u>no school meal debt!</u>

- Reimbursement determined by <u>ISP and number of meals served</u>
- Alternatives for FRP percentages included in CEP guidance
- CEP operates on a <u>four-year cycle</u>
- Schools/districts operating CEP must <u>check ISPs at least once per year</u>



#### How Does CEP Work? <u>direct certification enrollment + categorical eligibility enrollment</u> total enrollment <u>total enrollment</u> <u>identified student percentage (ISP)</u> <u>% for other child nutrition</u> programs and school funding \* multiplier = % meals reimbursed at federal free rate federal paid rate) 1.6

# (Very) Brief History of CEP Policy

## **Legislative History**

- Authorized December 2010 by the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act
- Phased roll-out / pilot in 10 states + DC
- 2014: study found that, for every 10 students directly certified, an additional 6 students were FRP-eligible by application → 1.6 multiplier
- Available nationwide starting in SY 2014-2015

Identification, Notification, and Publication of <u>Eligible</u> LEAs and Schools (7 CFR 245.9(f)(5), (6), (7))	LEAs or schools with ISPs 40% or higher.	LEAs or schools with ISPs <b>25% or higher</b> .		
Identification, Notification and Publication of <u>Nearly</u> <u>Eligible</u> LEAs and Schools (7 CFR 245.9(f)(5), (6), (7))	LEAs and schools with ISPs <b>30-40%</b> (30% ≤ ISP < 40%)	LEAs and schools with ISPs <b>15-25%</b> (15% ≤ ISP < 25%)		



## What Can (or Can't) USDA Do?

#### Can

- ? Lower or eliminate ISP threshold
- ? Adjust ISP multiplier between 1.3-1.6

#### Cannot

- ⊠ Raise multiplier beyond 1.6
- ☑ Allow statewide CEP
- ☑ Implement Healthy School Meals for All

April 1	<ul> <li>Counts of identified and enrolled students as of April 1 are used for CEP eligibility determinations.</li> </ul>	
April 15	<ul> <li>State agencies must provide district-wide CEP eligibility to LEAs.</li> <li>LEAs must provide school-level eligibility data to state agencies.</li> </ul>	Ask your
May 1	<ul> <li>State agencies must post CEP eligibility lists online.</li> <li>State agencies must send the link to CEP eligibility lists to USDA FNS.</li> </ul>	state agency!
June 30	<ul> <li>LEAs must notify state agencies of intent to participate in CEP.</li> </ul>
