 - Meals: 0
 - SFAs participating in NC Feeding: 4 Sponsors/40 Sites
 - Meals (B&L): 1,325,736
- Total NC Meals: 1,363,084

- Initiate a new timeline for submitting summer feeding plans;
- Earlier SFSP Trainings;
- Earlier submission of Rural Pocket requests;

Summer Meals 2023 Impact

- Hosted county-wide planning meetings in all LFPC counties
- Marion County LFPC served as a first time noncongregate meal site
- Provided free food boxes to selected meal sites in Greenville and Marion County through the states local food purchase assistance program
- 5 new first time library meal sites (2 served non-congregate meals)
- Strengthened relationship with external partners including Department of Education, SC Thrive, State Library



Thinking Differently for Summer 2024

- Creating a summer meals learning collaborative with local food policy council and 4 SCORH health coalitions
- SC Plants the Seed Library Model
- Work with Tribal Organizations and Hispanic serving organizations to cultivate additional sites and sponsors
- Coordinate site visits for elected officials
- Begin to plan for Summer-EBT 2025 implementation







Successful Non-Congregate Meal Service Models for Rural Areas: Implementation Guide

In approved states beginning summer 2023, Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) and NSLP Seamless Summer Option (SSO) sponsors can operate non-congregate programs in rural communities without access to a congregate meal site. Find more information in <u>USDA's</u> Implementation Guidance for Summer 2023 Non-Congregate Meal Service in Rural Areas.

This resource outlines effective models for non-congregate meal service. Use this guide to find strategies and tactics to execute a successful non-congregate summer meals program in your rural community.

Please reach out to your state agency to confirm the availability of non-congregate meal service and allowable models. Note: States are not required to make the non-congregate option available this summer. State agencies had to submit a plan to USDA for approval by April 1, 2023 to allow non-congregate meal service in summer 2023.
