More Kids than Ever Before Qualify for Free School Meals

63% of children attending U.S. K-12 public schools are enrolled to receive free or reduced-price school meals – that's over 31 million kids.

Research shows that free school meals can reduce food insecurity and improve student health and academic performance. Children from low-income households and those enrolled in federal assistance programs including SNAP and TANF qualify for free school meals, but many schools now offer free meals to all students, reducing stigma and improving student equity.

Free and Reduced-Price Meal Enrollment is at an All-Time High

U.S. public schools reported **31.4** million children were enrolled for free or reduced-price meals during the 2023-24 school year. This is an increase of **4.5%** from the previous school year, with an additional 1.3 million kids now enrolled for free or reduced-price school meals.

This level of growth is unprecedented. Free and reduced-price meal **enrollment grew 0.9% on average before the COVID-19 pandemic**, an average increase of 300 thousand kids per year.

Increased utilization of national programs that expand access to free and reduced-price meals may explain the significant increase in free and reduced-price enrollments in school year 2023-24.



- The <u>Medicaid Direct Certification Demonstration Project</u> allows states to directly certify students for free and reduced-price meals based on Medicaid data, reducing the burden on families to complete meal applications. 21 states joined the project or expanded scope in school year 2022-23 and 2023-24, and many of these participating states correspond with those that had significant increases in the free and reduced-price enrolled children.
- Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) allows schools and districts to serve no-cost meals to all kids regardless of household income. Anecdotally, national participation in CEP has grown significantly. Looking at preliminary data from 11 states as a sample of the country, CEP participation increased from only 32% of schools pre-pandemic to 55% of schools this year.
