







MFSN's Mission & Vision



An estimated 17 million Medicaid enrollees are food-insecure, of which nearly half are children. By 2030, our goal is to expand the number of Medicaid-enrolled children and families who are proactively connected to federal nutrition programs (SNAP and WIC) and complementary Food is Medicine services.


We will do so through mobilizing a national network of food security champions committed to building the Medicaid system's political will and urgency to value, invest, partner, be accountable to, and integrate and modernize systems to close food and nutrition insecurity disparities.

MFSN Year in Review - Accelerate Policy Change

Legislation introduced or passed with MFSN assistance

Passed:

 Colorado HB24-1322: 1115 waiver for nutrition supports feasibility study

Introduced:

- VA Federation Virginia food ILOS for pregnant and postpartum individuals (food boxes + SNAP/WIC navigation + nutrition counseling)

MFSN 2025-2026 policy change menu

Vision: activate advocates to mobilize Medicaid systems to create for enrollees pathways to healthy food access and nutrition security

- 1. Protect Medicaid and SNAP
- 2. **Foster state technical assistance and coalition-building partnerships** increase opportunities for wins and address barriers
 - a. Create template Medicaid managed care food security policy requirement language
 - Generate resources on SNAP+WIC as part of FIM and address non-duplication
 - c. Continue supporting Medicaid-SNAP integration
 - d. Address how states are fiscal-scoring investments and benefits
- 3. **Generate actionable evidence** that advocates can use to advance Medicaid food security strategies. Research on:
 - a. Update MFSN Policy Dashboard
 - Medicaid health plan food security screening and connection to SNAP + WIC
 - c. Current state of SNAP and WIC data-sharing to healthcare sector

Feeding America message-testing: talk about Medicaid and SNAP together!



Food and health go together. You need nutritious food to be healthy. You also need access to doctors and medications. Cutting programs that help people meet these basic needs will lead to a hungrier, sicker America.

People are struggling right now, costs of food and health care are already out of reach. Working families need Medicaid and SNAP more than ever.

Now is not the time to cut these life-saving programs.

You can't get more than \$1 trillion in budget cuts from Medicaid and SNAP without taking health care and food away from millions of low-income children and parents, pregnant women, seniors, veterans and people with disabilities, exactly who these programs were designed to protect.

WHY IT WORKS:

- Makes a strong case for why people need access to affordable health care and food.
- Gives a warning about what could happen hunger increases, and people become sicker.
- Its weakness: it does not mention seniors, children, and other populations they care about.
- Speaks to the struggles people have right now affording food and health care.
- Focuses on working families.
- With concerns about the economy heightened, this is timely.
- Gives \$ amount makes clear these are massive cuts and makes this message feel more real.
- Names populations voters are concerned about.
