Waivers!

USDA has extended the following waivers through June 30, 2021. Check with your state agency.

Flexibilities extended for SBP, NSLP, and CACFP:

- Meal pattern requirement waiver
 - Additional flexibility: OVS in high schools is <u>not</u> required
- Non-congregate waiver
- Meal service time waiver
- Parent/guardian pick-up waiver

Flexibilities not extended:

- Activity requirement waiver for CACFP
- SFSP waivers (unanticipated school closures)

What is the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)?

- Enables high-eligibility schools to provide breakfast and lunch to all students at no cost to them
 - Often heralded as the antidote to "school lunch shaming"
 - Students have equitable access to all meals reduced stigma
 - Decreased administrative burden no school meals applications!
 - School nutrition fund can benefit tremendously
- CEP is a 4-year cycle
- Schools, or groups of schools, must have an "Identified Student Percentage" (ISP) of 40% to operate CEP

Identified Student Percentage (ISP)

Identified students are categorically-eligible for free school meals and identified through **direct certification**.

Students are identified by their participation (or a household member's participation) in the following programs:

- SNAP: Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program
- TANF: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families
- FDPIR: Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- Medicaid*

Children who are...

- in foster care,
- homeless,
- in Head Start/Early Head Start, and/or
- migrants

should also be included in an ISP. However, their eligibility does *not* extend to siblings or other household members.



of "identified" students total student enrollment × 100

*Available in: CA, CT, FL, IL, IN, IA, KY, MA, MI, NE, NY, NV, PA, TX, UT, VA, WA, WV, and WI.

CEP Reimbursement Pattern

Two categories of reimbursement: Free & Paid

Free reimbursement rate = ISP \times 1.6

Paid reimbursement rate = $100\% - (ISP \times 1.6)$

"Magic ISP" = 62.5% (62.5% x 1.6 = 100% of meals reimbursed at the free rate)

ISP	x 1.6 Multiplier	% of Meals Reimbursed at "Free" rate	% of Meals Reimbursed at "Paid" Rate
40%	x1.6	64%	36%
45%	x1.6	72%	28%
50%	x1.6	80%	20%
55%	x1.6	88%	12%
60%	x1.6	96%	4%
65%	x1.6	100%	0%

SNAP enrollment is increasing... That means ISPs are increasing, too.

In Florida, enrollment jumped more than 36% between February and May. In Texas, it went up nearly 19%. Maryland saw a 417% increase in SNAP applications from March to April.

Conduct direct certification often to ensure every newly eligible child is captured in your schools' ISPs.

Lock in a high (or higher!) ISP in SY20-21.



Grouping

- The 40% threshold may be met by:
 - an individual school,
 - a group of schools within the district, or
 - all schools in the district.
- Groupings can maximize reimbursement and participation by students.
- Consider...
 - ISP by school
 - Enrollment by school
 - Participation by meal type and fee category
 - Meal debt accrued each year, by school
- Consider grouping high ISP, high enrollment schools with lower ISP, lower enrollment schools

GROUP OF SCHOOLS A, B, and C	245	420	58%	92.8%	7.2%
School D (adopting CEP but claiming on its own)	630	1000	63%	100%	0%
School E (not adopting CEP)	200	600	33%	N/A	N/A



CEP & Title I Funding

Plus, State Education Funding & E-Rate



What is Title I?

Title I, Part A, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965

Provides federal funds to districts with high percentages of low income students to improve academic achievement

Funding may be used for additional resources such as teachers, materials, afterschool or summer programs, etc.




 Allocates ~\$15bil. funds to state agencies based on census data and cost of education by state



State Agencies

- Allocates funds to districts using U.S. census poverty data
- Almost all districts receive Title I funds



Districts

 Districts allocate funding to schools, typically using the free and reduced-price school meal rate as a proxy for school-level poverty





How do districts determine school-level eligibility for Title I funds?

Section 1113(a)(5) of the ESEA requires an LEA to select a poverty measure from the following options, or to use a composite of one or more of these measures:

- Free and reduced-price school meal data
- Identified student percentage (ISP), with or without a multiplier
- Number of students participating in TANF
- Number of students participating in Medicaid
- US Census data, in combination with free or reduced-price school meal eligibility, TANF, or Medicaid data

What about CEP & other education funding?

State Education Funding

- State and local education funding makes up ~ 92% of elementary and secondary education funding nationally. (Federal funding, including Title I makes up about ~8%.)
- Eligibility determinations for state education funding vary.
 - 30 states require CEP schools to administer "alternative income forms."
 - Others use ISP*1.6 or participation in other means-tested programs.
 - View each state's approach to determining CEP school's eligibility for education funding

E-Rate Funding

- Funding for technology and internet
- CEP schools can use ISP*1.6





CEP Deadlines Extended for SY2020-2021

April 1-June 30, 2020: Identified student percentage must be established for determining the eligibility and the claiming percentages to be used.

April 1-June 30, 2020: State agencies notify school districts of districtwide eligibility status and provide guidance and information. School districts submit school level data to State agencies.

June 30, 2020: State agencies post the school districtwide and school level lists on website to indicate schools eligible for CEP for the following school year (SY 2019-2020).

August 31, 2020: Interested and eligible school districts must notify their State agency of their intent to participate in CEP.

Format for Data

If you have a new set of data to upload for a given school district, please save the Excel file in the *.csv format before uploading.

File must contain columns in this order:

- LEA Name (School District)*
- School Name*
- Enrollment*
- Number of Identified Students per ISP*
- ISP Percentage*

*All fields are required.

Data Set Values Beginning of Range * Enter the low end ISP percentage that you want to create groups of schools

End of Range

Enter the high end ISP percentage that you want to create groups of schools for.

Step Value



Create groupings at these intervals between the beginning and end range.

Helpful Tips

You can create data sets to match a certain average ISP across all schools within a Set.

- Beginning of Range: the low or beginning value to start calculating with.
- End of Range: the high or end value if you want to generate sets that cover a range of values.
- Note: If you do not enter a End of Range value it will simply create data sets that match the low value or Beginning of Range value.
- Step Value: this is how much it increments between the Beginning and End of Range values. The default is set to 1.

Here are a few examples:

- If the Beginning of Range is set to 50% and the End of Range is set to 60% and the Step Value is set to 5 - then it will calculate data sets that meet these ISPs:
 - 0 50%
 - 0 55%
 - 0 60%

Compare multiple grouping scenarios

 Continue to monitor ISP and revisit any groupings to possible add schools to maximize reimbursement.

Partial Implementation

- Good option when some, but not all schools are eligible for CEP
- Good way to try out CEP before expanding to others


