## Waivers for Summer 2021

- Congregate Meal Service
- Meal Service Time
- Parent/Guardian Meal Pick-Up
- Area Eligibility



## Waivers for Summer 2021

- Meal Pattern
  - Available for SFSP through June 30, 2021
  - Available for SSO only through September 30, 2021



## Waivers for Summer 2021

- On-Site Monitoring for SFSP
- First Week Site Visit for SFSP
- Offer Versus Serve for Non-School SFSP Sponsors
- Area Eligibility for Closed Enrolled SFSP & SSO Sites



# Vaughn Next Century Learning Center

Pacoima, CA

- Bulk options! Served 1-2x per week
  - Chose days/times according to family input collected via surveys and Zoom forums
  - Combination of hot, refrigerated, and frozen meals for the whole week
  - If a family needs special accommodations,



#### YMCA SPOTLIGHTS OF PANDEMIC WAIVER UTILIZATION



Y of Memphis & Mid-South, TN is establishing pathways of equity through partnerships – serving 700 kids before pandemic to 23,000 kids now through collaborations with schools, city, and churches -community food distribution centers that began as <a href="Grab & Go Sites">Grab & Go Sites</a> through the Non-Congregate Waiver have also evolved to serve as virtual education learning support labs too!



The Y of Greater Boston, MA utilizes the Non-Congregate Waiver to provide home delivery of meals to apartment complexes. Through a grant with the Housing Authority they are also able to include adult meals. In partnership with the Greater Boston Food Bank, the Y is also able to distribute bags of groceries in their community. Altogether the Boston Y has served 4.2M meals since the pandemic began!

#### YMCA SPOTLIGHTS OF PANDEMIC WAIVER UTILIZATION



The On-Site Monitoring Waiver has helped Ys across the country like Capital Area YMCA in Trenton, NJ quickly onboard other Ys as sites in their state to ensure more communities have access to the meals kids need and provide hands on training for potential new sponsors!



YMCA of Detroit, MI utilizes Meal Service Time Waiver for Multiple Day Distribution to help provide a week's worth of food on different days at different sites to expand their staff capacity and reach in the community to serve more youth!



The **Greater Valley YMCA, PA** utilizes the **Area Eligibility Waiver** to serve at sites that previously did not meet the threshold for 50% FRL. The Y noticed that these new sites had over 100 youth participate on the first day and many parents shared they were facing extended unemployment in these areas.

### Food Bank Spotlight: Food Gatherers in Ann Arbor, Michigan



#### **Importance of Current Waivers:**

- The USDA waivers that the Michigan Dept of Education secured were CRUCIAL to our ability to feed kids.
- Non-congregate waiver (families can take meals home)
- Meal-time waiver (multiple meals can be distributed at once)
- Parent pickup (kids did not have to be present to be served)
- Area eligibility (allowed us to serve families in areas <50% FRP)</li>



#### **Looking Ahead: Child Nutrition post-pandemic**

- These waivers will allow us to meet the needs in the community even in non-pandemic times.
- Area eligibility or flexibility is so critical to be able to serve families in need in rural communities.
- Combination of non-congregate, meal time, parent pick-up waivers helped at most sites and would be ideal in the future!
  - Rural sites, when travel time is a barrier. More efficient to pick up a lot
  - Young kids who stay home but can't go to a community center (even if in housing community) "to eat on site".
  - Families with different daily schedules, kids sleeping in during summer
- Having the option (when safe) to serve meals on site if that works best

## **Feeding America Network Practices**



#### Pre-packed boxes with enough food for the entire family

- Second Harvest Food Bank of the Mahoning Valley (Youngstown, OH) shifted from BackPack to School Pantries with items that are student-friendly and easy to prepare
- Harry Chapin Food Bank (Fort Myers, FL) shifted away from choice School Pantries to food kits to comply with strict safety protocols

#### Mobile distributions

- Southeast Missouri Food Bank (Sikeston, MO) increased their ABC mobiles when schools closed
- Gleaners Food Bank of Indiana (Indianapolis, IN) partnered with a local school district to use their school buses to deliver meals to their community when schools shut down

#### Providing PPE for schools to order

 Maryland Food Bank (Baltimore, MD) offered PPE to schools alongside food that they could order for their School Pantry program

#### Doubling the impact: Groceries plus meals

- Redwood Empire Food Bank (Santa Rosa, CA) offered groceries alongside congregate meals
- Many food banks offered pre-packed family-style boxes alongside school meals
- Feeding the Gulf Coast (Theodore, AL) did produce drops at summer meal sites in rural communities over the summer; they also shared recipes, Census info, and SNAP application info

#### Maximizing flexibility

Good Shepherd Food Bank (Auburn, ME) and HACAP Food Reservoir (Hiawatha, IA), among others, used different models to get the meals out: drive thru, delivery, or smaller packs for students to bring home
